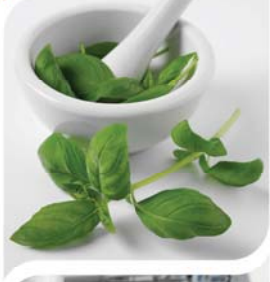

Mackay, Queensland, Australia

Mackay is located in Queensland Australia. The Mackay region in North Queensland lies in the heart of some of the most visited tourist areas in Australia. Mackay enjoys a picturesque location, as it is surrounded up and down the coastline with a number of beautiful beaches.



As well as being a destination in its own right, Mackay makes an ideal base from which to explore many of the highlights of Queensland. The Great Barrier Reef and the Whitsundays are all within close proximity.

Mackay's weather is tropical, with hot summers and warm sunny winters. The city is situated 400km north of the Tropic of Capricorn and its weather is likened to Hawaii. Summers are typically tropical, hot and wet, although an afternoon sea breeze does help cool things down.

The region lies in what is known as the tradewind belt for most of the year and this results in south to south east winds. Daytime temperatures during Summer average 29-30C, falling to 23C at night. Mackay's average annual rainfall is 1585mm with most falling during December-March. August and September are almost totally dry.



Eungella National Park is at the head of the gorgeous Pioneer Valley. The park is named from an Aboriginal word meaning Land of the Clouds and ranges over 51,700 hectares. Finch Hatton Gorge is where you will find some of the unique Australian wildlife including platypus, gliders, bandicoots and ring tailed possums or explore the coastal Cape Hillsborough National Park, also famous for rugged scenery, walking tracks and native wildlife



Mackay is the gateway to some of the world's most beautiful islands and the one of a kind Great Barrier Reef. Charter tours can take you snorkelling, diving or fishing out on the crystalline waters off shore and you can meet some of the colourful local marine life up close. Alternatively, there are Jet Ski tours for those who are a little more daring.



Captain Cook was one of very first explorers to visit Mackay in the late 1700s, however, it wasn't formally settled until one hundred years later by John Mackay. Mackay soon flourished as settlers arrived to stake their claims to land. It wasn't long before the success of the sugar crops in other parts of Queensland were replicated in Mackay. Today, Mackay produces over one-third of the country's sugar and you will often hear it referred to as the sugar capital of Australia.
